### Losing her husband, sharing her grief

They'd known each other for two decades, their paths crossing each week at church. And then, after all three lost loved ones, they were joined in grief.

That's when they found Legacy Hospice.

After Judy McKenzie lost her husband Leon in 2006, she desperately wanted to maintain their connection. She didn't want to lose touch with his memory. The hospice team had been there for Leon in his final days. And then it was there for Judy, helping her grieve his loss.

Legacy Hospice serves adults, children and their families with home-based care in the Portland metropolitan area and in communities throughout the Willamette Valley. Hospice services are also available in assisted living settings, adult foster homes and nursing care facilities.

Hospice workers are trained to treat the physical, emotional and spiritual needs of patients and support family members and other caregivers.

When Leon was at Legacy Hopewell House near the end, Judy says, the staff met his every need.

Because it was hot, the hospice team took him outside to the courtyard, applied cold compresses and brought him plenty of water. The staff also reminded Judy to eat.



And then, after Leon passed away, hospice staff provided Judy with the emotional support she needed. She attended the annual Light Up A Life ceremony, when survivors gather to honor the memory of their loved ones.

In recent years, she had invited two friends from church to the ceremonies. All three drew strength from Legacy Hospice. Attending LUAL together became a meaningful and healing ritual that helped Judy see her husband's death from another perspective.

"It showed me that it wasn't just over," Judy says. "His memory will always be here."

# Legacy Hospice provides grief support in uncertain times

They gathered in the courtyard on a warm spring afternoon, keeping their distance and sharing their sorrow.

It had been an especially difficult week. Eight patients at this assisted living facility had died of COVID-19 and the staff was struggling with their own feelings of loss.

So, Legacy Hospice grief counselors invited them outside to share their stories and work through their fraught emotions in the early, uncertain days of the pandemic.

This is the very heart of Legacy Hospice: meeting grief at its source, whether at a patient's home or in a care facility.

Legacy Hospice treats the needs of patients and supports their families. But hospice workers also work with caregivers, whether they are professional healthcare providers or friends and relatives. They all suffer loss in different ways.

In the courtyard that afternoon in June, caregivers grieved the patients who had passed and expressed their own fears about illness, family and work. The pandemic added another layer of stress for caregivers. They didn't want to bring the coronavirus home. One worried about hugging her son. Another had to care for a high-risk husband, navigate the unknowns at the grocery store and then go back to work the next day.

"That's exhausting," says Petya Pohlschneider, bereavement coordinator at Legacy Hospice. "Even the doctor was working seven days straight. She's in the front ranks, carrying the load. It's sobering."

The grief counselors listened and let the caregivers know their feelings of fear and anxiety were valid and real. And, most important, the counselors offered hope.

Legacy Hospice has been especially busy during the pandemic, despite the limits and challenges. The staff has adapted by providing virtual therapy for groups and individuals.

"Our team," Pohlschneider says, "has been nothing short of outstanding."
